A Point of Interest.

The Internet - Don't Believe All you Read

Having recently updated to phone with internet, I have been surfing many web and facebook pages, and found that most of the content is total rubbish with no substance or integrity.

As a person with a keen interest in history I find it very difficult to comprehend why people publish information on these pages without verifying the facts first.

I have in the past clarified the naming of Launching Place, and the Photograph of the Elephants in Main Street Warburton. This time it is how Yarra Junction got its name.

(Little Yarra Junction) Yarra Junction

When Robert Hoddle travelled through here in the 1840s he crossed the Little Yarra River, (east of todays township) by a bridge in which he constructed. Later when the goldminers travelled through to Reefton and beyond they used this crossing. The early Bridle Track from the Warrandyte diggings passed through Coldstream and Killara to Launching Place and Old Warburton crossing the Little Yarra River. Back in these days to get to Gippsland and Walhalla via Warragul was impossible in Winter time due to the Koo Wee Rup Swamp. A Mrs Bowman payed to have a Bridle Track cut from her Beaconsfield Hotel through to the Warburton Diggings. This track went through Beenak and "junctioned" with the track from Warrandyte at the "the Little Yarra "river, hence the early name of "the Little Yarra, Junction". "The town that sprung up at this location became known as "Little Yarra Junction". When the railway came in 1901 the "Little " was dropped from the name.

The theory of the two valleys meeting fits in but not correct, and the one about the railway and tramway is just so wrong by date.

POWELLTOWN.

BUSH NURSING HOSPITAL.

A meeting was held in the Powelltown Hall on Friday, 18th inst., to consider a proposal to build a hospital in Powelitown. There was a fair attendance. Mr. Gribble, who has taken a great interest in trying to have the hospital established here, introduced Mr. Hansford, treasurer of the Bush Nursing Association, Melbourne. In an interesting speech Mr. Hansford said that his association would give a grant of £250 towards the hospital and dispensary, under the following conditions: The hospital to be built on a site of not less than one acre, and to be well away from noise and smoke of mills; to be lit by electric light; to have a septic tank installed; head nurse to be paid £208 per annum, also two local assistants to be kept; there must be at least ten local guarantors for the nurses' salaries. It is estimated that the cost would be about £500 per annum. Mr. Gribble is to canvass the district to see what support is likely to be obtained.

Mr. J. Ingram (who occupied the chair) moved a hearty vote of thanks to Messrs. Hansford and Gannon, who had motored from Melbourne to attend the meeting. A meeting is to be held at a later date to receive Mr. Gribble's report as to what support has been promised.

A POOR FAMILY.

One would hardly believe that in a rich, prosperous district like that of Woorl Yallock there are people so poor that they are compelled to live in hovels. Yet such is the case, it one is to judge from a report furnished to the council by the secretary. The report stated, inter alia, that a man and his family were so residing at Woorl Yallock, which was most undesirable from a health point of view. Mr. Burgoyne, the inspector, was instructed to inquire and report to the council.

OPENING OF THE WARBURTON CHESS CLUB.

The Warburton Chess Club was auspiciously opened on Thursday night at the Mechanics' Institute. One of the many interesting events was the simultaneous playing against, three of the leading Warburton players by Mr. Cockrill, a visitor from the Melbourne Chess Club. He maintained the honor of the parent club, as one after another of the local players succumbed to his superior skill. Mr. Cockrill merely paced up and down the floor, and after a moment's glance at the various boards abruptly moved his piece and walked quickly to his next opponent. He subsequently acknowledged that he was more physically than mentally tired. Mr. Cockrill's genial disposition and interesting little lessons on chess were much appreciated by those present, and he helped to clear away some misunderstandings regarding "castleing" and "en passant" moves entertained by one of the local students of the game.
